He provides an honest and humorous account of the seismic changes he's seen both in broadcasting and the football industry. There are countless memorable anecdotes and inside stories of working with everyone from David Coleman and Brian Clough to Gary Lineker and Alan Shearer – all infused with a deadpan pessimism acquired during almost five decades following Middlesbrough.
