## Stoke City Minute by Minute

The clock is ticking ...

## **Prematch**

The bell goes in the changing rooms. In the stadium, the background current pop-chart ditty fades through into the ominous, brooding, glowering introduction of the guitar chords of Eminem's Oscar-winning 'Lose Yourself'. Fans around the ground get to their feet in anticipation, jigging gently from foot to foot in time with the music, and also from the cold, often bitter wind that swirls about even in summer months. A minute or so later the stadium announcer Steve Buxton screams in an ever-rising voice: 'Ladies and gentlemen, please welcome to the Bet365 Stadium the visitors [whoever they are] and your mighty, MIGHTY POTTERSSSSSSS!!!!!!!!!

The opening chords to the Stoke City FC club anthem 'We'll Be With You', written by *Neighbours* theme-tune penners Tony Hatch and Jackie Trent, sung by the victorious 1972 League Cup squad, strike. Fans sing along: 'We'll be with you, be with you, be with you, every step along the way!', as the players emerge from the tunnel, mascots in hand, led by the match officials, who collect the ball off a little podium positioned by the corner flag (at least in the Premier League years ...).

As the players line up for photos in front of the main two-tier stand, the music segues into Tom Jones's 'Delilah', a song adopted and adapted by supporters, as legend has it, one day in Derby when the police asked them to stop singing lewd songs in a pub and the (in)famous fan known as 'TJ' (Anton Booth) broke into his favourite tune, which then was sung throughout the ensuing match and forever after.

The players shake hands along the lines and break to warm up, with the Potters taking the half of the pitch in front of the Boothen End, where fans are packed into the red and white seats, rising to greet their heroes with a tumult of noise, clapping and scarf or flag waving. The fever rises ...

Game on!

#### 2 November 2013

As wind billows around the Britannia Stadium, Southampton kick off in the Premier League, but their early pass forward is intercepted by Erik Pieters, who knocks the ball back safely to goalkeeper Asmir Begović. The Bosnian international thwacks the ball downfield and a gust of wind propels it towards Artur Boruc's goal. It lands on the D of the Saints' penalty area, where it seems to take on supernatural powers and careers crazily over Boruc's head, bouncing once more before ending in the top corner of the Boothen End net. No one really knows how to celebrate. They are too busy being incredulous. It is a record-breaking goal in many senses: the first goal of Begović's career, the longest goal ever scored in recorded professional football at 92 metres (before being beaten by Newport's Tom King in January 2021 with a distance of 96 metres) and the quickest goal in Premier League history at just 13 seconds. Remarkably, it also makes Begović the season's joint leading scorer for Stoke, for a week at least.

#### 6 December 2014

In yet another eventful edition of Potters fans' favourite Premier League grudge match against Arsenal, Stoke take the lead when a Steven Nzonzi cross is missed at the near post inexplicably, by Calum Chambers, who will later see red for two bookable offences to complete a miserable personal day. The ball ricochets off Héctor Bellerín and Mame Diouf, wrong-footing Gunners keeper Damián Martínez, and falls perfectly for Peter Crouch, right in front of goal, to just roll into the back of the Boothen End net with a gentle side-foot with his right peg. The chants of '1-0 to the rugby team' ring around the Britannia as Arsène Wenger pretends he didn't see that.

#### 13 May 2000

Stoke get off to a tremendous start in the Second Division play-off semi-final first leg against Gillingham at the Britannia Stadium. Despite the Gills taking the kick-off and sticking an aimless long ball out of play in the Potters' left-back position, the throw is worked forward to Kyle Lightbourne, tight on the left touchline ten yards inside Gillingham's half. The beanpole striker hugs the line to beat one man then cuts inside to leave another grasping thin air. He then squares the ball to the on-loan Arnar Gunnlaugsson, just outside the penalty area, and the Icelandic international hammers a left-footed drive into the top-left corner from 18 yards to send the home support ballistic.

#### 11 November 1989

In City's first game since the sacking of manager Mick Mills following the 0-6 thrashing at Swindon the previous weekend, caretaker manager Alan Ball restores attackers Vince Hilaire, Gary Hackett and Wayne Biggins to the starting line-up, as well as veteran centre-half George Berry, and is rewarded with an opening half hour of verve and ambition. Right from the off, City pile forward and midfielder Carl Beeston drives into the penalty area, exchanges passes with Dave Bamber and prods in past the onrushing John Keeley in the Brighton goal. The Ball era has started well.

#### 1 January 1987

Stoke begin the new year perfectly, scoring within a minute of the kick-off of the Second Division game against Shrewsbury at the Victoria Ground. In front of the biggest home crowd of the season, 19,382, Carl Saunders starts and finishes a move, which also involves Phil Heath, Nicky Morgan and Brian Talbot. The 1-0 victory, on a rain-sodden pitch, is City's seventh in eight games in a golden patch around Christmas, with a goal aggregate of 24-6 over the run, which takes them from 20th position to fifth after this latest win.

#### 26 December 1950

Having defeated Arsenal at Highbury the day before, Christmas Day, Stoke clinch a well-deserved double over the Gunners thanks to a goal by young striker Roy Brown. His right-foot shot proves too hot for new keeper Ted Platt, replacing the unfortunate George Swindin from the previous game, and the ball squirms into the net. Although that is the end of the scoring for the day, Brown's involvement switches to the other end of the pitch on 15 minutes, as Stoke keeper Dennis Herod picks up an injury which means he cannot continue in goal and Brown pulls on the jersey to tend nets instead. With no substitutes available, Herod plays 75 minutes on the right wing, smiting the bar with one tremendous shot. City survive a late Arsenal surge, even though wingers Malkin and Ormston also hobble around for the last few minutes of a tense encounter

#### 17 December 1960

Right-back Bill Asprey roams forward to pounce on a mishit clearance and fire in a right-footed shot from the edge of the penalty area, which struggling Plymouth's goalkeeper Geoff Barnsley saves. But the rebound goes straight back out to Asprey, who lashes home gleefully. The goal sets Stoke on their way to a club-record 9-0 win. Within two minutes, Plymouth's George Fincham has inadvertently bundled the ball into his own net in front of an unforgiving Boothen End to put Stoke two up. Neil Dougall's Argyle capitulate from that awful start.

#### 15 April 1963

In a dramatic first minute of a vital game against promotion rivals Sunderland, Stoke are awarded a penalty by referee Mr J. Thacker, when Dennis Viollet is felled in the act of prodding home a loose ball. Viollet picks himself up to slot the penalty home in front of a jubilant Boothen End. More than 42,000 are jammed inside the

Victoria Ground just three days after City drew 0-0 at Roker Park in front of over 62,000. With a home 1-0 victory over Cardiff thanks to a Viollet goal on the Saturday in between also having over 30,000 inside the Vic, a total of 135,000 fans watch City in those four days, as the team pick up five points on their way to promotion.
